I. Aim of the Course:

The aim of this course is to inform the students with the history of British civilizations from ancient times to the eighteenth century covering social, historical, geographical, political cultural, economic elements of the British people and theoretical knowledge related to the genre. This course covers the origins, the development of British civilization and also questions the motive behind how the British people became a nation throughout ages. This course also covers the social, cultural development of the British from the middle ages to the age of enlightenment. Around historical incidents and exemplary cultural texts students are expected to learn the characteristics, literary conventions, movements and trends of the British of those periods. Inter-related elements can be used enterprisingly to build up a coherent frame of reference about what life was like in Britain.

III. Method of Instruction:

This course will be conducted through discussions and in the form of lectures in hybrid style which means the course will be conducted in the class physically and at the same time via Microsoft Teams online. If the conditions would not let live stream online, the recordings of the session will be uploaded to Microsoft Teams class materials. All the students will have been assigned to their courses / classes; therefore, all students are expected to use Microsoft Teams with their student ID's and passwords. All the relevant information has and will be shared on the University and Faculty web pages. The students are expected to join the class having read the assigned material as it is essential to take part in all kinds of class activities and discussions. The course will be supported through such visual materials as documentaries, movies, and videos, which will be shown and/or assigned to the students periodically throughout the semester.

IV. Course Requirements:

The students are expected to follow the class having read the assigned material. For each reading material, they are supposed to prepare discussion questions either individually or as a group, and they are expected to participate in class discussions and group activities.

No cell phones and other phones are allowed in the class. Use of interactive technology is allowed only when it is required for the assignment, for contacting group members or research (Place devices under your seat during lectures). Photos or video should not be taken in class without prior permission (personal use only allowed in emergency).

Apart from watching for educational purposes, any kind of sharing or using the videos or any course material is illegal and therefore will be penalised.
