I. Aim of the Course:

The aim of this course is to provide a broad study of representative texts of different eras to raise students' awareness of the English drama from the medieval period to the Restoration Age. The religious and moral basis of the first dramatic approaches will be studied by mystery plays and morality plays from the Middle Ages; the literary glory of drama in the Elizabethan period will be emphasised by referring to the social, historical and cultural aspects of the era, and two plays by Christopher Marlowe and Thomas Kyd will be read to see the reflection of these on the stage; around the turn of the sixteenth century, Elizabethan drama is replaced by Jacobean drama that will be studied in detail with the analysis of Ben Jonson's play; and the term will be ended with exemplary plays from Restoration drama. In this course, the changes between the periods will be identified and how these changes are worked in the plays will be discussed.

IV. Method of Instruction:

This course will be conducted through discussions and in the form of lectures. The students are expected to come to the class having read the assigned material as it is essential to take part in all kinds of class activities and discussions.

V. Course Requirements:

Regular attendance and active participation. Attendance is compulsory. The students are expected to come to the class, having read the assigned material. For each reading material, they are supposed to prepare discussion questions either individually or as a group, and they are expected to participate in class discussions and group activities.
