SYLLABUS

Course	: IDE 454 Shakespeare: Plays and Staging
Instructor	: Assoc. Prof. Dr Mustafa Sahiner
Year and Term	: 2023-2024, Spring

1. Aim and Contents: The purpose of this Course is essentially to enable students to acquire a relatively high and sufficiently wide view of Shakespeare's dramatic art and literary significance through a close study of some of his plays. In this respect, the plays chosen for study are exemplary of his use of different dramatic forms, techniques and concepts. In the context of this basic strategy, the contents of the Course will be as follows; at the outset, there will be a general introduction to the social, cultural and literary background of Shakespeare's time, with emphasis on the development and practice of drama in Renaissance and/or Elizabethan England. In this context, the theory of dramatic forms, will be explained in a concise way with adequate illustration from his plays.

2. Course Outline:

Weeks I: Introduction: a general review of some of the important contextual material. A brief introduction of the contents, types, and canonical importance of the plays to be studied.

Week II: Shakespeare's idea of comedy. A Midsummer Night's Dream.
Weeks III: Tragedy and Shakespeare's idea of tragedy. Hamlet
Week IV: Roman Tragedy/History: Julius Caesar
Week V: History Plays: Henry V
Week VI: Problem Plays: The Merchant of Venice
Week VII: Problem Plays: The Tempest
Week VIII: No Class (Ramadan Feast Holiday
Week IX: Midterm Examination (Tentative)
Week X: No Class (National Sovereignty Day)
Week XI: Student performance of A Midsummer Night's Dream
Week XII: Student performance of Hamlet
Week XII: Student performance of Julius Caesar
Week XIV: Student performance of Henry V and The Merchant of Venice
Week XIV: Student performance of The Tempest

3. Textbook: Various editions of Shakespeare's plays are available for students to choose from. However, among these editions are to be recommended the Arden, Penguin, Cambridge and Oxford editions. Since all the Shakespearean texts have been standardized and textually well established, the students can use any of the modem editions available to them.

3. **Method of Instruction:** The course will mainly be conducted through lectures, especially as regards the study of the contextual and theoretical material. However, in textual studies and discussions, student participation will be required. **Additionally, each student is expected to participate in the performance of one of the plays covered in this course.**
